

## **OKWU Milestone Timeline**

## **Institutional and Campus Development**

1905	Founded Rocky Mountain Missionary and Evangelistic School in Colorado Springs, Colorado
	1910 – renamed Western Holiness College and Bible Training School
	1925 – renamed Colorado Springs Bible Training School
	1950 – renamed Colorado Springs Bible College
	1959 – moved to Bartlesville, Oklahoma, and renamed Central Pilgrim College
1909	Founded Miltonvale Wesleyan College in Miltonvale, Kansas
	1972 – merged with Bartlesville Wesleyan College in Bartlesville, Oklahoma
1917	Founded Pasadena Bible Training School in Pasadena, California
	1947 – merged with Holiness Evangelistic Institute
	moved to El Monte campus and renamed Western Pilgrim College
	1960 – merged with Central Pilgrim College in Bartlesville, Oklahoma
1930	La Quinta (Spanish for Country Home) designed by architect Edward Buehler Delk
1932	Birth year of La Quinta – Spanish Mission Style residence and Carriage House (garage)
	Cost \$500,000 to build (2020 equivalent = \$8.8 million)
	Architect–Edward Buehler Delk; Contractor/Builder–Joe P. Gier;
	Assistant – Freeman Matthews; Helpers – Raymond Fritton and William Vandel
	Located 3 miles from downtown, on the old Highway 75, consisted of 160 acres
	Land boundaries: Caney River (north), Hillcrest Drive (west), Silver Lake Road (east)
	Occupied by H. V. Foster, his wife Marie (Dahlgren) and two daughters – Ruth and Marie
	Hosted many famous people in the guest wing on the north side of the rose garden
	Largest mansion in the area at the time: 32 rooms, 7 fireplaces, 14 bathrooms, mahogany
	paneled library with hidden staircase, hand-painted ceilings, wrought iron balconies,
	roof of Spanish tiles, stucco covered walls, and a 4-story tower
	Automatic player organ was built for La Quinta by Aeolian Company of New York
	Landscaping included rose gardens, fountains, hand-painted Spanish tiles, and 25 varieties
	of trees and shrubs
	Irrigation was provided by a pump in the Caney River ½ mile away
	Summer of 1932 – 500 red and white flowers (petunias or peonies) bordered flower beds
1932	Founded Holiness Evangelistic Institute in El Monte, California
	1947 – merged with Pasadena Bible Training School – renamed Western Pilgrim College
	1960 – merged with Central Pilgrim College in Bartlesville, Oklahoma
1935	La Quinta earned a Certificate of Award as the best example in the residential class by the Kansas
	City Chapter of the American Institute of Architects
1937	Founded Pilgrim Bible School in <b>Spokane, Washington</b>
	1941 – merged with Colorado Springs Bible Training School

1939 H. V. Foster passed away at age 63

Family moved to the Foster Ranch south of Bartlesville

(El Rancho de la Codorniz – Ranch of the Quail)

La Quinta occupied by caretakers for 9 years

Marie Dahlgren Foster married Clarence E. Burlingame in 1942 and lived with him in an English Tudor mansion on 48 acres adjacent to and south of the La Quinta property. After Clarence's death, Marie moved back to El Rancho de la Codorniz in 1961 and lived there until she passed away at age 99 in 1983.

1941 Established American Boy Academy in La Quinta for grades 5-9 – closed in 1948

The academy's mission changed after the Pearl Harbor bombing and it became the American Military Academy

Leased for \$1 per year – 173 acres, 2 lakes, and 3 buildings:

- (1) La Quinta
- (2) Carriage House (garage)
- (3) Paul Dahlgren House (Mrs. Marie Foster's brother) a.k.a. the South Barracks or Pink Palace
- 1948 La Quinta was vacant for two years except for caretakers

During this time, some vandalism and deterioration of the building occurred

1950 **Central Christian College** (Church of Christ) opened on campus (1958 – moved to Oklahoma City)
Some furnishings in La Quinta were loaned and others given to Central Christian College:
paintings, carpets, draperies, and furniture

Buildings constructed in 1950:

- (1) Girls' Dorm (now Suzanna Wesley Hall)
- (2) Bookstore (small brick building enlarged in 1962 & named the Music Hall)
- (3) L-shaped frame building north & east of La Quinta, used for Chapel & classes
- (4) Men's dorm (a.k.a. the Barracks) south of Science Building & east of Drake Library
- 1958 Sold La Quinta and 152 acres to local real estate developer, L. E. Scott

Mrs. Marie Foster Burlingame retrieved family furnishings from La Quinta

The land was sub-divided:

- (1) 20 acres containing La Quinta, Carriage House, and the four buildings added by Central Christian College
- (2) Established Hillcrest Heights neighborhood on the north side
- (3) Established Country Club Terrace neighborhood on the southwest side
- 1958 **Purchase of 20 acres** for \$140,000 by Colorado Springs Bible College consisting of:
  - (1) La Quinta
  - (2) Carriage House
  - (3) Girls' Dorm (now Suzanna Wesley Hall)
  - (4) Bookstore building located on southwest side of Wesleyan Lake
    - enlarged in 1962 & named the Music Hall razed in 2000
  - (5) L-shaped frame building in the approximate location of Chapman Hall
    - used as Chapel and classrooms until 1974 when it was used as a men's dorm (a.k.a. Warrior Lodge) until the December 1974 completion of Dorm 74 (Orange Scott Hall)
    - used again as the Chapel and classrooms until razed in the late 1970s/early 1980s
  - (6) Men's dorm (a.k.a. the Barracks) (located in what is now the parking lot east of Drake Library and south of Science Building) razed in the early-to-mid 1970s

1959	Clarence E. Wert, President – served CSBC 1957-1959 (Colorado) and CPC 1959-60 (Bartlesville)
1959	Renamed as Central Pilgrim College (formerly Colorado Springs Bible College)
	A junior college with a four-year ministerial degree program
1960	Western Pilgrim College merged with Central Pilgrim College in Bartlesville
1960	Dr. Norman N. Bonner, President – served CPC/BWC from 1960-1962 and 1964-1969
1962	Dr. R. G. Flexon, President – served CPC from 1962-1964
1962	Constructed President's Home (east side of campus, along Silver Lake Road) – used as the Business Office from the early 1970s until razed in 1998 to construct the Chapel/Fine Arts Cente
1962	Doubled the footprint of the bookstore building – renamed as the <b>Music Hall</b> (razed in 2000)
1963	Received accreditation for the Junior College Division of Central Pilgrim College
1965	Constructed Wert Hall
1968	Merger between Pilgrim Holiness and Wesleyan Methodist denominations
1968	Renamed Central Pilgrim College as Bartlesville Wesleyan College
	A two-year college with a four-year religion degree program
1969	Dr. Leo Cox, President – served CPC/BWC from 1969-1974
	Acting BWC President – September-November 1983
1971	Purchased seven acres to form the <b>Athletic Field</b>
1971	First intercollegiate athletic team was basketball
1971	Warrior mascot for intercollegiate athletics
1972	Merger of Bartlesville Wesleyan College and Miltonvale Wesleyan College
1972	Accredited as a four-year, degree-granting institution
1972	Painted La Quinta – bone with olive black trim
1972	Formation of Wesleyan Lake
1972	Purchased 2301 Silver Lake Road – a.k.a.:
	1972 – Greek House (men's dorm until 1975, then women's dorm & head resident home)
	1996 – Adult Education Division
	2001 – Professional Studies Division
	2003 – Adult & Graduate Studies (AGS)
	2021 – Graduate & Professional Studies (GPS)
1972	Constructed maintenance storage facility at Athletic Field
1973	Completed the first Prayer Chapel in the former ping pong room of La Quinta's basement
1973	Constructed the W. P. (Bill) and Alice (Merle) Haltom Campus Center
1974	Constructed Science Building
	Renovated in 2013 and dedicated as the Robert and Joyce Campbell Science Building
1974	Inaugurated Dr. John Snook as President – served BWC from 1974-1983
1974	Constructed Dorm 74 – renamed Orange Scott Hall in 1997
1974	Began Elementary Teacher Education program
1975	Graduated first class of elementary teacher education majors
	the first 4-year degree other than religion
1975	Addition of three modular housing units for women (a.k.a. the Mods) on the west side of Greek
	House – Modular units were removed in 1995
1976	Donation by Dorothy Glynn Adams of a 6-acre strip of land with a barn – south side of campus
	Barn was razed – land used to build Performance Center and Buildings & Grounds Center
1977	5-acre nature study area donated to BWC (west side of Athletic Field)
1977	Held Commencement in the rose garden for the last time – future commencements held at:
	First Wesleyan Church (1978-1979)
	Performance Center (1980-1998)
	Chapel/Fine Arts Center (1999- )

1978	Granted full accreditation by North Central Association of Colleges
	A four-year, Christian, liberal arts college
1979	Dedicated the Performance Center; renamed Mueller Sports Center in 2004
1980	Changed athletic mascot to the Eagle
1981	Purchased 1669 Silver Lake Road and 100 acres
1982	La Quinta at age 50 is designated as a Registered National Historic Site
1983	Dr. Leo Cox served as Acting President – September-November 1983
1984	Inaugurated Dr. Paul Mills as President – served BWC/OKWU from 1984-January 2002
1984	Bestowed the First Honorary Doctorate to Rev. Armor Dale Peisker: "a man of service"
1986	Created the Eagle's Nest (named in honor of MWC's snack shop) in the Performance Center
1987	Dedicated the Women's Cottage
	1996 – donated by Dr. Tom and Joan Phillippe and renamed Phillippe Residence Hall
1987	Purchased President's Home – 2122 SE Mercury Court – Sold in 2017
1988	Established the La Quinta Preservation Foundation to restore, maintain, and preserve La Quinta
	mansion for future generations
	Received grants from: Adams Foundation, The Kerry Foundation, The Lyon Foundation,
	Phillips Petroleum Foundation, and Silas Foundation
	Oversaw renovations of \$225,000 through 2003:
	Stained, painted, and covered with plexiglass: stained glass window above main stairway
	Repaired and restored: fountains (south garden and rose garden); marble wishing well;
	ceiling in dining room/president's office
	Restored: sandstone walkway; brass shutter dogs; stucco; wrought iron
	Created and installed: hand painted tilework on garden benches and tower
	Replaced exterior doors with solid oak doors: 40 out of 77 doors on east side & living room
	Installed: shutters; wrought iron rails to assist visitors
	Planted and maintained gardens, often by master gardeners
1989	Official Seal for BWC was created by a student
1989	Began the Cooperative Association of States for Scholarship (CASS) program
	First group of 16 students (from Central America) came to take classes
1989	Began adult degree-completion program in Bartlesville – Names for the adult program:
	1989 – Management of Human Resources (MHR)
	1996 – Adult Education Division
	2001 – Professional Studies Division
	2003 – Adult & Graduate Studies (AGS)
	2021 – Graduate & Professional Studies (GPS)
1991	Established a sister institution in Japan – Ogaki Women's College
	19 exchange students came to BWC for a 3-week ESL week program
1991	Began adult degree-completion program (Management of Human Resources) in Tulsa
1992	Graduated first class of Communications majors (Bachelor of Science)
1993	Established the Nursing Center in the renovated Carriage House
1994	Offered nursing courses for the first time
1994	Began "Operation Facelift" fundraiser for the Girls' Dorm (Women's Dorm/Wesley Hall)
	a project of Western Area of Wesleyan Women International
1995	Established the <b>Division of Nursing</b> and graduated the first class of nurses (associate degree)
1995	Remodeled the Greek House & dedicated it as the <b>Adult Education Center</b>
1995	Began adult degree-completion program (Management of Human Resources) in McAlester
1996	Refurbished the Dining Hall/Dining Commons
1995	Dedicated the <b>Buildings and Grounds Center</b>

1997	Repaired and restored the Wesleyan Lake
1998	Dedicated the Allen Chapman Hall
1998	Repaired two cast iron bells in the rose garden and the missing bell was cast and installed
1998	Held groundbreaking for the Chapel/Fine Arts Center
1998	Began nursing adult degree-completion programs – Tulsa, Afton, Sallisaw, Oklahoma City area
1999	Began nursing adult degree-completion program in McAlester
1999	Painted the exterior of La Quinta in historical colors (\$100,000+)
1999	Reinstated the Music Major
1999	Began December Commencements
2000	Nursing – RN/BSN Completion Program granted initial accreditation
	Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE)
2000	Began nursing adult degree-completion program in Bartlesville, Miami, Muskogee
2000	Began business adult degree-completion program in Afton
2000	Dedicated the Lyon Chapel/Fine Arts Center
2001	Dedicated the C. B. and Mabel Colaw Hall
2001	Dedicated and renamed Women's Dorm as Suzanna Wesley Hall
2001	Renovated the W. P. (Bill) and Alice (Merle) Haltom Campus Center
2001	Changed institutional name to Oklahoma Wesleyan University
2002	Offered the first Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree
2002	Began business adult degree-completion program in Enid
2002	Dr. Charles Joiner, Interim President – served OKWU from 2002-2003
2003	Dr. Everett Piper, President – served OKWU from 2003-2019
2003	Opened new teaching site for the Adult & Graduate Studies program – 4500 South Garnett, Tulsa
2004	Teacher Education program granted initial accreditation
	National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE)
2004	Business program granted initial accreditation
	International Assembly for Collegiate Business Education (IACBE)
2004	Renovated the President's Conference Room – now <b>Doc Lacy's Coffee House</b>
2004	Began the Prelude to Christmas celebration which was presented through 2013

2006	Launched the Church Administration and Leadership program – Adult & Graduate Studies
2007	Began nursing adult degree-completion program in Kansas, OK and Coffeyville, KS
2008	Began nursing adult degree-completion program in Topeka, KS
2008	Launched the first online programs – business and nursing
2008	Purchases of Honors Houses continue on the east side of Silver Lake Road
2009	Dedicated the Lisa and Mark Roberts Fitness Annex
2009	Launched Master of Education (M.Ed.) program
2009	Adult & Graduate Studies moved to 10810 East 45 <sup>th</sup> Street in Tulsa (Highways 169 & 51)
2009	Dedicated the Ernie & Caroline Lewis Alumni Park
2000	featuring iron gates and lights from the north (original) entrance to campus
2009	Dedicated the Janice and Charles <b>Drake Library</b>
2009	Installed <i>The Blind Man Rising from the Pool of Siloam</i> sculpture created by Scott Stearman
2010	OKWU Professors ranked #1 in USA by CBS Money Watch (also in 2011, 2012)
