#### NOW CAMPAIGN UPDATE

# Year One

Between now and 2030, the NOW Campaign will raise \$68 million to invest in the future of OKWU. During the first year of the campaign, over \$6 million has been pledged.

# **Campaign Overview**

The three major priorities are the endowment for student scholarships (\$30 million), the expansion of the athletic/fitness space on campus (\$20 million), and the campus renaissance (\$18 million). Also included is a plan to increase the annual fund from \$600,000 to \$1 million.

# **Immediate Focus**

For 2023 and 2024, the following goals will make an immediate impact on current OKWU students:

- \$250,000 by December 2023 for added parking, safety lighting, and security cameras
- **\$500,000** by December 2023 to renovate and modernize one of the older dorms on campus
- **\$1 million** by July 2024 to increase multi-use housing capacity for students
- **\$3 million** by December 2024 to install the first outdoor track in school history and improve the outdoor athletic space

# FACULTY STORY

# A Heart for Questions

**Dr. Jonathan Ensor ('05)** returned to OKWU in 2019 after more than a decade of teaching at the high school level. Since his return, he has become a foundational part of the OKWU experience for nearly every student, teaching courses from Old and New Testament Literature to Biblical Hebrew. In 2023, he received Faculty of the Year honors from the OKWU student government and served as the commencement speaker.

Ensor's OKWU story goes back to the early 2000s, when he was a student at another college but was looking for a change. As he drove around his hometown of Tulsa, he heard a radio ad for OKWU. Before long, he showed up on campus and started asking questions. He qualified for an academic scholarship and also earned a spot on the men's soccer team, and Ensor transferred the next year.

Ensor, who had grown up in the Christian faith, had recommitted his life to Christ as a young adult. While he loved the Bible classes he was enrolled in, he declared a business major at first. Eventually, through prayer and reflection, he decided to invest his time in the study of the Scriptures and switched his major to Biblical Studies.



"What I found when I was here was that it was permissible to ask questions," Ensor said. "I found a place where I could really ask questions and be in a supportive environment where scholars and adults would gather around and be able to listen, engage, and equip me with the resources needed to go looking for answers."

# **Called to Teach**

After graduating in 2005, Ensor's ministry path began. He was working as a youth minister in a local church when the private Christian high school he had attended approached him, asking him to help evaluate and refine their Bible curriculum. Ensor agreed and soon found himself in the classroom, teaching students with some of those same questions he had asked in recent years.

"The classroom became the place of rich ministry, and I continued to find my heart drawn to that," he said.

Ensor grew to love the classroom environment and the plentiful opportunities he had to invest in the lives of his students. For 15 years, he served as a Bible teacher and campus minister, planning chapels in addition to his classroom responsibilities. Along the way, he made the choice to further his own education, earning a master's from Asbury and his doctorate from the London School of Theology.

# From Student to Scholar

In 2018, a friend from OKWU called him and told him about a position opening up the School of Ministry and Christian Thought. Ensor applied, though he didn't really expect that his alma mater would be interested in him. But he received the job offer and joined the faculty officially in the fall of 2019.

Over his four years at the college level, Ensor has found the same joy in the classroom that he had when he was teaching high schoolers.

"People who come to university generally come with a posture of openness and a readiness to explore things that they don't know," Ensor said.

As Ensor looks to the future, he sees great days ahead for  $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OKWU}}$  .

"This is a community that is committed, not just to getting students to walk across the stage but committed to equipping them with the skills they need to live out their faith and earn a meaningful income while living out their calling," he said. "In some ways, that's autobiographical for me. It's in the fires of community, campus life, academics, and chapel where I found a faith that was able to go the distance." (#)



# Legacy of Generosity

THE CAMPBELL STORY

#### Bob ('62) and Joyce Campbell's relationship with Oklahoma Wesleyan University goes back over 60 years.

They can trace their roots to the Miltonvale Wesleyan College (MWC) days, where Bob attended for three years, starting during his junior year of high school and continuing through his first year of undergrad. Joyce came to MWC as a senior in high school. For Bob, MWC was always the place – his sisters had attended before him, and he had looked forward to it since he was young. Joyce chose it after years of attending public schools, eager for the Christian atmosphere. They were engaged following their freshman year, and they've been a team ever since.

Though their time at the university was relatively short, it was foundational for the rest of their lives. They maintained close ties to their alma mater in the decades since. For Bob, his time at the college sparked in him a love of science that would define his career.

"Science and faith have been so important in my life. The science came because of what happened at the university," he said. "The faith was there first, beginning with godly parents, and it was reinforced by a wonderful home church. What happened in college was like how steel reinforces concrete. It provided a foundation for the rest of my life."

"The spiritual atmosphere was always present," Joyce said. "Every class began with prayer. Always."

Bob earned his degrees from Kansas State and Purdue, but his interest was kindled on the campus at Miltonvale.

"My first science class at the university was chemistry," he said. "Professor Ted Suffridge made the subject come alive to me. It totally changed my life." Campbell earned his PhD in organic chemistry, and he worked in the research and development of materials like plastics, fibers, and adhesives. While he earned his doctorate, Joyce became the family's breadwinner, taking secretarial and bookkeeping work to provide for their young family. Following Bob's graduation, his first job took them to Bartlesville, Oklahoma, in 1966.

They arrived before the opening of the Bartlesville campus, but their close proximity gave them a chance to be involved. Their three children were on campus often since it was within walking distance of their home. In the 1980s, Bob was recruited by the science faculty to teach an adjunct course. He taught organic chemistry at the college until a new job took the family to Ohio in 1988.

Shortly after they settled into a new home in Ohio, Bob received a phone call asking if he would consider joining OKWU's board of trustees. He agreed and has been a supporter of the university ever since.

#### Lifetime of Giving

The Campbells have been pillars of generosity for years. "Our first gift to the university was when we were graduate students," Bob remembers. "Throughout time, we've had an awareness that a school like OKWU relies on gifts for viability."

When presented with the vision for the *NOW Campaign*, the Campbells agreed to partner with the university once again, providing a generous lead gift to the campaign that included the establishment of the Dr. Ted Suffridge Professorship, part of OKWU's endowment plan for the future.

"The NOW Campaign is about making sure that OKWU will be ministering to as many students as possible for life-changing opportunities," Bob said. "It's our hope that those students will encounter the

There is a personal element for the Campbells as well. Over a decade ago, they established a scholarship fund to incentivize their own grandchildren to spend time as OKWU students. Their granddaughter, Cori Campbell, graduated from OKWU in May 2023, a living embodiment of what the Campbells believe OKWU can do.

"Giving to the university changes lives," Joyce said. "We want to impact people and change their lives so they will go out and be a witness to the world."

And naming the professorship after Dr. Suffridge is a way of completing the full circle that began when Bob was a teenager sitting in Suffridge's classroom.

"We named it after him because of the impact he had on my life. It's a way of honoring him." Bob and Joyce Campbell established the Dr. Ted Suffridge Professorship with a \$500,000 lead gift — with the hopes of inspiring others to invest in OKWU's future.

# ALUMNI AWARDS

# 2023 Outstanding Alumni Awards

In recognition for their courage, achievement, and commitment to OKWU's vision and mission, we proudly present this year's Alumni Awards.



Alumnus of the Year: This award recognizes an alumnus who advances the Kingdom of God through noteworthy, long-term accomplishment in professional endeavors, significant service to the church, and a positive impact in the lives of others.

Max Colaw's first pastoral appointment came when he was 19 and a student at Central Pilgrim College. He had been asked by the district superintendent, his father C.B. Colaw, to pastor a church in Newkirk, Oklahoma, that had been closed. On his first Sunday in 1964, only one family attended.

Colaw was obedient to the ministry, and eventually the average attendance at that church reached the 30s every Sunday. Later, while he was finishing his degree in Oklahoma City, Colaw was appointed to another church that was without a pastor in Enid. For two and a half years, he made the 180-mile round trip each week to pastor that church.

In 1970, Colaw accepted the full-time pastor position at the Wesleyan Church in Enid. He and his wife, Ruth Ann, moved to Enid, where they lived for the next 21 years. During that time, Colaw and his family dug deep roots in the community and witnessed the growth of the church.

Then, in 1990, Colaw was nominated for the position of district superintendent that was opening up. Over the course of a few days, Colaw felt the Lord speaking to him through his devotional time. He accepted the nomination, which sent him and his family to Bartlesville. He would serve as the superintendent of the Tri-State District for the next 29 years before his retirement in 2019.

Colaw's ties to OKWU have remained strong over the years. He is a former alumni president and has served on the Board of Trustees since 1988. He met his wife at the college, and their four children and their spouses all graduated from OKWU. Ruth Ann completed her degree at OKWU after they moved back to Bartlesville.

"We have a great respect for the university," he said. "I believe that not only do you get a good education here, but the relationships you build with other students that become lifelong relationships are very valuable."

Being named the Alumnus of the Year was a surprise to Colaw, who has never sought recognition throughout his career.

"It's interesting that, as the doors opened along the way, I never pursued any of them. I never put out a resume." Still, the opportunities kept coming.

"I wanted to be obedient to the Lord."



Young Alumnus Award: This award is given to an individual under 40 who displays distinguished leadership and in his or her field and shows promise of future growth professionally and personally.

Joshua Klumb ('07) has learned how to stay busy. He serves his South Dakota community in many ways, working as a farmer, a church staff member, and as a state senator. His passion for local politics, which was rooted in his high school experiences, was nurtured during his time at OKWU.

Klumb arrived to campus in the fall of 2003 to pursue a business administration degree. He helped to found a chapter of the College Republicans and served in multiple positions of the student government. He was class president during his freshman and sophomore years, and served as the student body president as a junior and senior.

After graduating in 2007, Klumb was a summer intern for Senator John Thune in Washington, D.C. He made connections in the South Dakota State Legislature and worked there after his internship ended. Eventually, he was invited to serve as a Legislative committee secretary, a part-time job where he ran the committee, called the votes, and kept minutes.

By 2014, Klumb had 6 years of experience in the Legislature. When a position in the State House of Representatives became available, Klumb decided to run. He won the seat. In 2016, he ran and won a seat in the State Senate. He has served in that position ever since, though he is nearing his term limit.

In addition to his political work, Klumb and his father and brother work the farm that Klumb grew up on. Klumb is also the Director of Technology for RiverTree Church in Mitchell. He was hired in 2022 after volunteering in the sound booth for years. Klumb and his wife are expecting their first child, and he is not entirely sure what he will do after his term expires.

"I don't know what my future plans are," he said. "My time in the legislature is definitely coming to its sunset years. For right now, I feel like God is calling me to focus on preparing for fatherhood."

Despite a lengthy resume, Klumb maintains humility when discussing being named OKWU's Young Alumnus of the Year.

"I am not a special person. It doesn't take anyone with great, deep pockets or special talents to do what I've done."

## **ALUMNI AWARDS**



Hall of Faith Award: This honor is awarded to an alumnus who is currently or has been in full-time, long-term Christian ministry and has demonstrated faithful, consistent service throughout that time.

Ken and Marilyn Blake have more than 50 years in ministry, including over 30 years serving as missionaries overseas.

Ken came to Central Pilgrim College from Fresno, California. At 14 years old, while attending a Billy Graham Crusade, he felt the call of God on his life. A Wesleyan evangelist would later speak at Ken's home church and recommended to him that he attend a denominational school. He chose Central Pilgrim College (later renamed Bartlesville Wesleyan), where he studied religion.

Marilyn grew up on a farm in Kansas, knowing since she was young that she wanted to be a missionary. She came to CPC to study nursing, believing that would be valuable for the mission field. She attended her final year of high school at Central Pilgrim and then took her pre-nursing courses before finishing the degree in Texas.

In June of 1969, Ken and Marilyn were married while Ken still had one final year of school. During that time, Marilyn served as the school nurse. The next year, they moved to Oregon, where they lived for the next 16 years. Ken earned his seminary degrees and pastored several churches, and all three of their children were born there. The couple answered the call to the mission field in 1988. They moved to Munich, Germany, and became the first Wesleyan missionaries in continental Europe. During those early years, they planted a church. In 1993, they moved to Russia to help missionary teams that were training schoolteachers. They founded a Bible school and planted multiple churches. After 12 years, they left Russia and returned briefly to the States before returning to Germany. They still live there today.

They retired from Global Partners in 2014, but a small international church called Munich Christian Fellowship asked them to consider staying on as pastors. The couple had been involved with the church previously, and they accepted the position, where they continue to serve today.

"We joke that when we were young, God called us to take the Gospel to the nations. Now that we're old, God brings the nations to us," they say with a smile.

Their faithfulness has taken them all over the globe – from Bartlesville to Oregon to Germany and Russia, and the impact of their faithfulness will echo on.





One Another Award: This honor recognizes an alumnus who has actively served others in some capacity for at least five years, advancing Christ's Kingdom through compassion and exemplary commitment of time, talent, and treasure.

Kristin Heck's distinguished life of service has included stints in two branches of the military and a successful civilian law career.

Heck grew up in Salina, Kansas, raised by her parents to give back to the community. She knew from a young age that she wanted to attend Bartlesville Wesleyan College. Three of her siblings had attended Miltonvale, and after its merger with BWC, Heck never considered another school.

Heck had dreams of attending law school after college, and at the suggestion of a professor, she studied business administration. She graduated in 1981.

However, Heck put off law school after she and her sister, Judi, decided to join the Air Force. Judi, a Miltonvale grad, had met her husband, Brad Scott, at college. Scott was an Air Force pilot, and the couple was living in Spain in 1981 when Scott was killed in a mid-air collision. Judi moved back to Salina, near her family, and she and Kristin started talking. Eventually, they decided to pursue commissions in the Air Force.

The sisters attended officer training school and graduated three weeks apart. Judi would go on to a



decorated Air Force career, retiring in 2006 as a full Colonel. Kristin spent 9 years in the Air Force before leaving in 1991 to enroll in law school. She earned her JD in 1994.

Heck once again answered the call to service, joining the Army Reserve in 1997. In 2002, she joined the Army full-time as a judge-advocate.

Heck served two tours, one in Iraq in 2006 and another in Kuwait in 2010, before retiring from the Army in 2012. In Iraq, the base she was stationed at was mortared daily. She remained active in military law as a civilian attorney until she retired completely from practicing law in 2018.

Heck went back to school after retirement, and received a degree in history from Kansas Wesleyan in 2020. She works at KWU as a researcher for the marketing and advancement offices at the university. You'd be hard-pressed to find a more accomplished individual than LTC Kristin Heck. However, her four degrees and two military branches served in are just bullet points to the larger theme of her life – service. But Heck is not someone who is out to broadcast herself or her accomplishments. (#)

# ATHLETICS

# ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME 2023 INDUCTEES

The Athletic Hall of Fame honors OKWU Eagles who have achieved excellence athletically, academically, and through high personal character. Inductees are graduates of OKWU, five or more years removed, who have participated on an OKWU varsity athletic team for at least two years.



# Wendell Thompson / Champion of OKWU Athletics

Wendell Thompson created the **OKWU Croquet** program in 2009 with the goal of imparting his love of the game to a new generation. He led the team for 11 seasons before retiring in 2022. In that time, the team won **5 national championships**, routinely defeating schools like Penn State, the U.S. Naval Academy, and the University of Florida.

What's the secret of OKWU's success? According to Coach Thompson, it's simple. "I've taught the students to do jump shots," he said. "That was our big secret. The other teams hadn't even heard of jump shots. And they were totally befuddled." Prior to starting the croquet program, Thompson served OKWU as the school librarian for 34 years.



# Dr. Brian Lee / Outstanding Athlete

Brian Lee ('94) came to BWC to play for **Coach Dan Wood** and would go on to become one of the most decorated players in **OKWU Soccer** history to that point. During his four-year career, he started every game, tallying 22 goals and 7 assists while playing as a central defender. He was named team captain for his final three seasons, chosen by his teammates and coaches to serve in that leadership position.

As a junior and senior, Lee received national attention as NAIA and NCCAA All-American, and in 1993 he was selected as the NCCAA Men's Soccer Player of the Year, now known as the Kyle Rote Jr. Award. In 1993, he led the team to a 3rd place finish at the NCCAA National Tournament.



# Will Price / Outstanding Athlete

Will Price ('16, '18 MBA) finished his **OKWU Baseball** career as one of the most accomplished players in NAIA history. In four seasons, he set OKWU records for hits, doubles, home runs, and RBIs, and he finished in 2nd place on the NAIA's all-time RBI list, coming up just one RBI shy of the record. He helped the Eagles make the NAIA World Series twice over his career, and in 2017 Price was the **Rawlings NAIA Player of the Year** and a **First-Team All-American**.

As a senior, Price had a .460 batting average to go along with 28 home runs and 101 RBIs. In his final college at-bat, at the NAIA World Series, Price smashed a home run.

# HARISSA D 35 Years of Service



"It's all about the people." That's the refrain of Charissa Dunn ('82) as she reminisces about her experience at Oklahoma Wesleyan University. And after more than 45 years since she first set foot on campus, Dunn has seen many people cycle through the college.

Dunn grew up knowing she would attend Bartlesville Wesleyan College. Her father was a district superintendent in Arizona and served on BWC's Board of Trustees, and the family frequently hosted visitors from BWC. When the time came for Dunn to make her college decision, the choice was clear to her.

After her parents moved from Arizona to Indiana, Dunn accepted a position as the secretary for the Dean of Students at BWC. While she worked fulltime, she was able to attend several night classes. As she accumulated credits and worked, she first earned her business administration degree and then decided to add an education degree.

"I took the eight-year plan," she joked, working full-time on campus and earning academic credits on the side.

She graduated in 1982 and immediately moved to the classroom, working as a high school teacher in Copan, Oklahoma, where she taught for 12 years.

#### **A PURSUIT OF EXCELLENCE**

In 1994, Dunn returned to run BWC's Learning Resource Center and work as a professor in what was called the Education Division at the time.

"Our school was the first in the state of Oklahoma to have so many required hours in classrooms before you graduate," she said. Dunn spent two decades in the classroom as the department's Student Teaching Supervisor and Practicum Placement Coordinator. In 2020, she transitioned to a new role at OKWU – alumni director.

"One of the things I really tried to do is figure out how we can get people back on campus and reconnected," Dunn said.

She notes the success of the alumni benefits cards that give alumni discounts on campus and free admission into games. She also spearheaded the digitizing of old yearbooks, all of which are now available on OKWU's website.

#### A CONTINUED LEGACY

Dunn will remain involved with the alumni planning team on a volunteer basis for the foreseeable future. She will continue to be a key part of planning OKWU Homecoming, as well.

As she looks back on her OKWU experience going back to her time as a student, Dunn is emotional. She thinks back to choir trips with the Lewis family, which she remembers fondly, as well as her classes that prepared her for working in public schools.

"You just don't realize going through the day-to-day how it all builds and all the things and experiences you've had," she said. "The professors were very helpful. They cared about you. They have high standards and expected you to meet them."

Even though she will be transitioning into a new era of her affiliation with OKWU, Dunn is likely to remain a fixture at events in the years to come. Since 1974, this place has been home. Though she may not have an office on campus anymore, her legacy of service to the university will endure in the years to come. 🕀

# National Teacher of the Year Awarded to Rebecka Peterson

# 2022-2023 HIGHLIGHTS NEW ALTITUDE FOR OKWU EAGLES

**Shawn Woods**, head coach of OKWU softball, earned his 100th career win last spring. Woods, who completed his third season with the program, led the Lady Eagles to a 39-18 record.

**Kirk Kelley**, OKWU baseball coach and athletic director, earned his 850th career NAIA victory last season. Kelley and the Eagles went 38-16 in the spring 2023 season.

# It's been a whirlwind for Laura Maria ('22) over the course of the last twelve months.

The OKWU women's soccer standout returned to Bartlesville in August 2022 for her final season and final semester of her collegiate experience. She was already one of the most accomplished athletes in OKWU's history, a nationally recognized player. One accomplishment, however, had proven elusive – the Lady Eagles had qualified for the NAIA Tournament but had not advanced past the Second Round to earn a spot at the Championships in Alabama.

With Maria leading the way in her final season, the Lady Eagles checked that box, and Maria etched her name in the history books, earning **NAIA Player of the Year**. During her final season, she scored 56 goals, one shy of the NAIA single-season record, and added 25 assists as the Lady Eagles posted a 22-1-1 record, winning the KCAC regular-season and tournament championships, and advancing to the NAIA Championship Final Site for the first time.

Maria ended her OKWU career with 119 goals and 60 assists over 88 games, an indelible mark on the program's record books. She looks back on her experience on campus with appreciation, noting her favorite memories are the times spent with teammates as they traveled and prepared to play.

"Once you leave, you really think about how those moments were very important," she said.

Originally from Brazil, Maria always wanted to attend college in the United States. After a year at a junior college in Kansas, she was recruited to OKWU and continued her playing career in Bartlesville.

Shortly after graduating, Maria signed a contract in Liga BPI, the first division in Portugal. She joined her team midway through their season.

It was a quick transition from college to the professional environment, but she was ready,

crediting Coach Ivan Ristic with preparing her to play at this level. "He was one of the best coaches I've had. When I got here, I didn't feel like I was behind anybody.

I felt like I was at the same level." For Maria, playing in Portugal was her first choice since she already speaks the language. "It was easy to say yes and come here." She had other offers in Europe.

Maria joined her new team, CS Maritimo, in late January. She appeared in 10 games, scoring 2 goals and adding 1 assist in her first professional season.

Whatever her future holds, her legacy as an OKWU athlete is secure. Maria's accomplishments include four appearances on the All-KCAC First Team, two KCAC MVPs, and three NAIA All-American nods.

And as she plays overseas, Maria is a living embodiment of the #BeOneSent mantra, fulfilling the mission and purpose of OKWU as she lives out her dream of being a professional athlete. (#)
